Title

Drag Story Hour

Brief Description

The Denville Public Library will partner with Edge NJ (https://edgenj.org/) to put on a weekly program of Drag Story Hour. Edge will provide a variety of drag performers as well as the training on performing for children (i.e., what is appropriate to say and what is not) and the Denville Public library will provide the snacks, crafts, and stories for the performers and families who attend the program. Additionally, all marketing and publicity will be designed by the Denville Public Library. This will be a series of programs that will be hosted on Wednesday mornings through the month of June to celebrate Pride month.

Goals/Objectives of the Program

Equity- The quality of being fair and impartial will be displayed by encouraging LGBTQ+ individuals and families to see themselves represented in the mirrors, windows, and sliding glass doors of the books that will be presented, the songs that will be song, and the activities conducted. By creating a friendly space for all to feel confident in being themselves and promoting that all are welcome.

Engagement- Because this is a family event, we are inspiring families to learn together and discuss their perspectives and values in support of the LGBTQ+ community. We are also engaging members of the community to support both a library event and a local business bringing recognition to both entities that some community members be unaware of their existence. This partnership could encourage more support for Edge NJ's mission and bring more patrons to open library cards and use other library services.

Empowerment- This program will hopefully encourage LGBTQ+ individuals and families to feel more confident and accepted in the community by educating more members of society. This will empower those LGBTQ+ individuals to feel stronger, more confident, and claim the rights they are entitled to in society.

Program Plan

Step-by-step instructions on how to conduct each phase of the program:

- Step 1: Reach out to Edge NJ and coordinate the drag performers for each story hour.
- Step 2: Distribute marketing/publicity materials.
- Step 3: Gather supplies needed for each week. Create a few samples of each.

Every week: speaker system, projector, screen, tables

Week four: Fizzing Rainbows

Step 4: Ensure proper staff coverage and arrange volunteers.

Step 5: Confirm drag performer and collect books and songs for the program. Provide a copy to each performer so they can rehearse ahead of time.

Step 6: Set up for the program.

- 1. Sound system
- 2. Projector and screen
- 3. Tables and supplies

Step 7: Conduct the program.

Week one: tie dye t-shirts

- 1. Cover tables with tablecloths provided in kit.
- 2. Give each family member a pair of gloves.
- 3. Encourage families to use the rubber bands to create designs on the shirts.
- 4. Allow families to use the variety of colors to dye the shirts.
- 5. Provide plastic bags for families to transport the wet shirts home to settle.
- 6. Educate families on next steps with the shirts at home.

Week two: Pride parade signs

- 1. Encourage families to use the markers and crayons to make signs that have positive messages for a pride parade.
- 2. Provide families with some of the rainbow flag stickers to use on their signs.

Week three: rainbow slime

- 1. In a bowl mix ½ cup water and ½ cup glue. Mix well to combine completely.
- 2. Add 4-6 drops of food coloring, mix well.
- 3. Pour in ¼ cup of liquid starch. Keep stirring until the liquid is gone and you have a gooey blob of slime.
- 4. Start kneading your slime! It will appear stringy at first but just work it around with your hands and you will notice the consistency changes. You can also put it in a clean container and set it aside for 3 minutes, and you will also notice the change in consistency! Important points to consider when implementing the program- beware there may be people who protest these events.
- 5. Repeat with each color of the rainbow food coloring.
- 6. Mix small portions of each color to make one large ball of rainbow slime for each family to play with.

Week four: fizzing rainbows

- 1. Print a rainbow template on construction paper.
- 2. Divide vinegar into small cups and color with food coloring, all colors of the rainbow.
- 3. Provide each family with baking soda, pipette, rainbow template, and colored vinegar.
- 4. Encourage families to sprinkle baking soda on the rainbow template.
- 5. Show families how to use pipette to suck up the colored vinegar and squirt it on the baking soda.
- 6. Discuss the scientific reaction that occurs between the baking soda and vinegar.
- Step 8: Clean up from the program.
- Step 9: Send out evaluations. Adjust program as needed.

Plans should also address the social justice framework:

Selection- books and songs educate children on some new terms and definitions used by the LGBTQ+ community and promote acceptance of one's own similarities and differences of others.

Connection- partnering with an organization in the community provides a relationship between the services of the library and the services offered by Edge NJ to better serve members of the LGBTQ+ community.

Reflection- using books and songs that educate the public causes us to reflect on our ideas and perceptions of the LGBTQ+ community ensuring that we can create a more welcoming environment and interactions with its members.



Other Considerations

Registrations- not required. We want all to feel welcome to attend and not restricted by advanced reservations.

Diversity advisory committee input – We would have members of Edge NJ as our diversity advisory committee who would be responsible for ensuring our books and songs are appropriate and considerate of the LGBTQ+ community.

Staffing needs for the program – At least three staff members are needed to execute this event. One to be available during the drag presentation should anything go awry, and the other two to set up the activity during the presentation-ensuring there are enough supplies and stations for all families in attendance.

Volunteer management – Volunteers are always welcome and encouraged to show their support. Volunteers will be helpful with setting up the activity, aiding families during the event, and clean up.

Program Evaluation/Assessment Tool
